

## **Meet SAB member John Kim**

Our Scientific Advisory Board (SAB) provides us with valuable insight and council on the most promising ALS research. In this issue we are delighted to shine the spotlight on SAB member John Kim, whose involvement we greatly appreciate.



Dr. John K. Kim grew up in South Korea and moved to the U.S. with his parents and three siblings when he was seven. He graduated from Yale, and earned his Ph.D. at UC-Davis before completing his postdoctoral training at Harvard Medical School.

Early on, John considered careers in music (as a classical violinist) as well as medicine, but research eventually won out. "My undergraduate research made me realize I wanted

to be a scientist," he explains. "I could discover things and be creative about solving problems. I also felt a deep connection with past scientists whose pioneering discoveries helped shaped what we know about our natural world today."

John and his wife Laurel moved to Ann Arbor in 2006 when he was offered a faculty position at the University of Michigan Life Sciences Institute. They soon discovered they had incredible neighbors. "When our neighbor Bob Schoeni was diagnosed with ALS and our neighbors banded together and founded Ann Arbor Active Against ALS, I marvelled at their resolve and spirit. I feel so lucky to have met them," he says.

While his family participated in many of our events, John eventually realized he could contribute in other meaningful ways since his research was tangentially related to some recent ALS research. With encouragement from his friend Dave Lowenschuss, John volunteered to serve on our Scientific Advisory Board in 2014.

Last summer, John accepted a faculty position at Johns Hopkins University where he continues his research in genetics, studying how small molecules called non-coding RNAs coordinate the expression of virtually every gene in our bodies.

"Supporting some of the great local scientists' work dovetails effectively with national ALS efforts," says John. "Some challenges in the immediate future are to better understand the mechanisms that lead to ALS, including the genetic causes and the underlying pathology. These efforts must go hand-in-hand with new drug screens and targeted therapies. Basic research is critical and the advent of next-generation research tools makes this a truly exciting and hopeful time to take on ALS."



#### **News from Johns Hopkins' 16th Annual ALS Symposium**

In March, Susan Miller and Suzanne Ross accepted the Robert Packard Center for ALS Research at Johns Hopkins University's Partners in Collaboration Award. The award was presented during the center's 16th Annual ALS Research Symposium, an annual event that brings together 180 scientists from more than 50 institutions to share their latest findings.

While there. Susan and Suzanne learned about a new initiative called Answer ALS. Described as the "single largest coordinated and collaborative effort to end ALS in the history of the disease," this effort brings together nearly two dozen research entities and 1,000 patients.

Sadly, just last month, one of the Packard Center's other award recipients, former Traveler's Insurance CEO Jay Fishman, succumbed to ALS. "Susan and I met Jay and his wife while in Baltimore," said Suzanne. "We were so saddened to hear of his passing."
